Membership categories:

Regular Division: Anyone who has served honorably in the rank of E1 through E9 in any branch of the military, active, guard or reserve.

Veteran Division: Anv officer of any branch of the military, active, guard or reserve.

Auxiliary: Anyone over the age of 18 who is related to someone who would have qualified for regular division status.

That includes spouses, brothers, sisters, nieces, nephews, parents, aunts, uncles, cousins, grandkids. That included pretty much anyone related either directly or indirectly to someone who has served.

Associate Division: People who have never served but support what NCOA does. They can be politicians, business people who support veterans etc.

November 2022 Security

Tips to help secure your accounts with strong passwords.

1. All the characters — no exceptions

For a more successful password, create one using a complex combination of letters, numbers and alternating capitalization. In this case, a phrase like "Bingo123" would be much better as "biNg01789." As you can see, the casing is alternated among the letters, and the numbers no longer follow an exact sequence. Four-digit passwords are least challenging for hackers. Passwords with fifteen plus symbols and characters are harder. Computers can scan millions of four-digit passwords in minutes. Longer passwords with symbols and characters in numbers of fifteen plus takes trillions of tries and longer. Hackers are looking for the simple way and faster. <u>Random.org</u> takes the guesswork out of password creation.

2. Think bigger

Use a phrase that you can remember like "fishing in deep water is better with clear line". Now change it to flsh%ndW*/btr4cL4210.

3. Being different is key

Do not use the same password for all accounts. If that password is compromised you will lose that much more, especially, if you use them for text, emails, finances, etc.

4. Sometimes, honesty is not the best policy

Here is something else you might not have considered: When setting up an online account, many sites will ask you to answer a series of security questions as an added layer of protection. Things like what was the name of the street you lived on as a child? Or, what was your first pet's name? Give false answers to real questions. It is not against the law.

5. It's not that hard to keep organized if you use this tool

A password manager is one of the biggest essentials for modern internet users. By using one, you're putting your passwords under encryption, which helps keep them safe.

A **password manager** stores and generates login information for all your devices and accounts. These programs can be installed as software or accessed through a website, browser extension or the cloud.

Our sponsor, **Roboform**, stores your passwords with just a tap or click. Online shopping and logins are easy thanks to its AutoFill function.

Roboform is available for Windows, Mac, iOS and Android and supports popular browsers such as Chrome, Firefox, Safari, Edge and Opera.

6. Google comes with a free password manager

Have a Google account? Then you also have a free password manager that makes it simple to create strong, unique passwords for all your online accounts. Your passwords are stored in your Google account.

I have a different password for every account and keep a record of them in excel on my flash drive (memory stick).

Terry Haines, *Chairman*: Terry enlisted in the US Navy for active duty between 1971-1977, honorably discharging as an E5. He then served in the US Naval Reserves between 1982-2006, retiring as a Master Chief Petty Officer (E-9), and he deployed twice for Iraqi Freedom between 2002-2003 and 2005-2006.

Ron Kohl, *Treasurer/Trustee*: Ron served in both the Air Force as a Tech Sergeant, and the Army as a Staff Sergeant before he retired. He also served in law enforcement and is committed to helping locals avoid fraud and scams.

Bud Cordes, *Knight Advisor*: Bud Cordes was a USAF Tech Sergeant who retired after 20 years of service in 1978. He served in Vietnam between 1968-1969.

Paul Mills, *Trustee*: Paul was a SPC in the US Army from 1987 to 1991 and his high point was serving in Berlin when the Berlin Wall came down.

Ken Wilson, *Vice Chair*. Ken served in the United States Navy for 4 years and was honorably discharged as n E-5 Boiler Tech. He served on four ships during his time. The first three he was part of the decommissioning party and he ended his career on board the USS Camden (AOE-2).

David Haines, *Trustee*: David served 24 years in the navy and Navy Reserve and 7 years in the Air Force Reserves where he deployed to Qatar in 2007-8. He achieved the rank of E-6.
